





# BEFORE I FORGET...

IT IS NOT THAT
CHRISTIANITY
HAS BEEN TRIED
AND FAILED, BUT
THAT IT HAS BEEN
FOUND DIFFICULT
AND LEFT UNTRIED.

— G. K. CHESTERTON

In his book, Chasing Joy: Musings on Life in a Bittersweet World, Fr. Ed Hays shares a wonderful story from the Taoist tradition of ancient China.

It's about an old holy man named Master Hu. Old Hu loved God. and God loved Hu. So whatever God did was fine with Old Hu and whatever Hu did was fine with God, since they were such good friends. Being good friends, God and Hu liked to kid one another, and Hu would jokingly call his Friend God "the Great Clod." That was fine with God, who joked with Hu in return, like giving him warts on his face, arthritis in his hands and feet, a canker sore in his moth, and even gout in his feet. God was such a great kidder, and that was fine with Hu, since they were such great friends.

As a result of God's numerous jokes, Old Hu grew lumpy as a toad and crooked as a human pretzel. "You Old Clod" Hu would shout at God, laughing, and that was fine with God. Just to show his old friend that He



was listening, God made Hu's right leg ten inches shorter than his left, and that made Old Hu walk around in little circles. Laughing loudly, Master Hu would say to the people in the village, "See how the Great Clod listens to me? Look how ugly and silly I'm becoming." Looking up to the sky, Old Hu would say, "Hey, Old Clod, you make me laugh and laugh, but that's what friends are for."

The villagers could only say, "Old Hu has gone crazy." Hearing them, Hu winked at the people and looked up to the sky, shouting, "Hey, Clod, are you awake or not? What's next?" And zap, another fresh wart on Hu's face. Now, the villagers were convinced Hu was crazy, and maybe he was. Had God also sent craziness down on him, along with warts, arthritis, and gout? If so, it didn't bother Hu: it was just fine with him since he loved God and God loved him.

As the years passed, Old Hu became the most twisted, arthritic, wart-covered, ugly, happy old man in China. Then, one day, looking up to heaven with his cataract-clouded eyes, he whispered, "Hey Clod, what now?" And God reached down and drew Old Hu right up into Himself. And that was just fine with Hu. That's what a friend is for.

True. This is only a parable. Master Hu never existed. Nor did the Prodigal Son nor the Good Samaritan. Parables are teaching stories to show us how to live, and also how God behaves.

To be a Christian is to be in a relationship with God which transforms us into more compassionate beings, "into the likeness of Christ." Likewise, having an adult relationship with the Sacred Scriptures (Bible), a serious relationship that grows and evolves, has the potential to be transformative as well.

Many of us get in a rut with our language or image of God. We can find our view of God is narrow and constricting. As our life experience broadens our understanding, some of us become conflicted whether we can believe at all. Some people, young, old, middle aged, tell me they don't believe in God. I can only reply, "Tell me about this God you don't believe in; chances are I don't believe in that God either."

Mystics, theological thinkers, and the Bible itself have shown that there are as many images and ideas to express the Divine as there are experiences of God. The biblical writers use rich metaphors and poetic language to point toward what is ultimately a mystery. The Divine is described as a potter,



a cup (of cool water), a path, a safe place, a rock, a burning bush, an eagle, and a whirlwind — all wonderful metaphors that help us assign a variety of attributes to the Divine without being the exclusive last word.

One of the most common ways of imaging God is as a father. Listening to many prayers and liturgies, one might think it was the only image of God in scripture. However, God is also imaged as a mother in Deuteronomy 32:18, "You forgot the God who gave you birth"; as a woman in labor in Isaiah 42:14; and as a comforting mother in Isaiah 66:13. Is God a mother? Yes. A father? Yes. A rock? Yes. A wind? Yes. Everything we use to refer to God is simply a limited, human effort to explain

the unexplainable. To be aware of our language and its implications is a great exercise in thinking theologically — remembering that the language we use to describe the Divine will directly influence how we relate to the Divine.

This is not a minor question. A person's — or faith community's view of God shapes everything else about it. The first question we need to think about for our spiritual lives is this: What is your image of God? Secondly, what is the content of your faith? What do you believe in? If you tell me you believe, what do you believe? There are certain faith-based initiatives that aren't great. Al Qaeda is a faith-based initiative! So what is the content of your faith? Third, what is the function

of your church? Why do we assemble Sunday after Sunday? If you tell me we gather to worship God, then I'll repeat the first question. Fourth, what is the purpose of your worship? If we come together to worship God, how does God want to be worshipped? Does God simply want us to say prayers — or is God more interested in prayers that lead to a life lived for the glory of God as we live lives of compassion, justice, mercy, peace, as we work for the Reign of God now? And then of course, it goes back to: What is the character of your God?

Those are the questions we have to face!

The ideas we hold about the nature of God and the language we use to describe God play out

in small ways — how or even whether we pray, how we think about our purpose in life, how we relate to those who do not share our beliefs. But they also influence how we see the world and, ultimately, God's role in the world.

This issue is about faith formation — not only for our children, teens, and their parents. Faith formation is a lifelong adventure. It's not just an intellectual formation of getting more knowledge. It's about becoming Catholic-Christian believers who have a loving relationship with God and who live as disciples of Jesus and His Way of Living.

Explore your faith as an adult. It can and will enrich your life as you journey as a believer.

# WHATISFAITH FORMATION?

For a short answer, we could say faith formation is preparing ourselves to live as disciples of Jesus. In his latest book, *Generations Together*, John Roberto reaffirms that faith formation informs, forms, and transforms the person—whether child, youth, or adult—into a vital and life-giving Christian faith that is holistic: a way of the head, the heart, and the hands. Roberto goes on to say, "While expressed in many different ways, faith formation seeks to help people:

- Grow in their relationship with God for the whole of life
- Live as disciples of Jesus at home, at work, in the community, and in the world
- Develop an understanding of the Bible and their faith tradition
- Deepen their spiritual life and practices
- · Engage in service and mission to the world
- Participate in the life and ministries of their faith community."

At Pax Christi, the Faith Formation team includes all of the above in our programs for all ages. One of Pax Christi's Mission and Values statements is "Lifelong Learning: We are in a lifelong process of learning how to live out our faith." On the next few pages, we provide a selection of what we have to offer you to form your faith. In addition, we invite you to watch our website's Faith Formation tab for updated information on adult, youth, and family faith formation opportunities that we are developing.

# **UPCOMING FAMILY EVENTS**

Our all-parish Faith Formation kick-off events are scheduled for Sunday, September 18, and Wednesday, September 21. The theme is *We Are Called to Serve*. We will open the gathering with a family-oriented prayer reflection and a fun trivia challenge. Then everyone goes to the service activity of his/her choice. We will be making things, putting packages of items together, and creating art pieces for charitable organizations that serve people and pets. Watch for details.

Inquiry will start in September. Participants are invited to grow more deeply in their faith and discern if joining the Catholic Church or completing one's initiation into the Church is what they desire.



# **GOOD SHEPHERD AND GODLY PLAY PROGRAMS**

Ages 4 Years-Grade 3, Good Shepherd; Ages 4 and 5, Godly Play

Level One: Sundays 6:30–7:45pm; Level Two: Sundays 6:30–8:00pm Godly Play: Sundays 6:30–7:45pm, Wednesdays 4:30–5:45pm, or Wednesdays 6:30–7:45pm

These are both hands-on methods of faith formation based on the Montessori method of learning. Because children learn by using their hands, working with materials allows them to enter more deeply into their relationship with God. The catechist fosters a relationship between the child and God with carefully prepared materials based on wonderful stories from our Scriptures, the parts of our Liturgy, and quiet meditation.

# CHILDREN'S LITURGY OF THE WORD

Ages 4 Years-Grape 4

During Sunday 9:00am and 11:00am Masses

The Children's Liturgy of the Word (CLOW) ministry enables children to participate in the Sunday worship experience, to nourish and guide their spiritual growth, and to immerse them in the Word of God in ways that are understandable to them. All children ages 4 years old through 4th grade are welcome to participate. The children are invited to come forward at the beginning of Mass and process to the chapel. They enjoy the Word of God on their level, shared prayer, singing, and activities. The children will return to their parents at the Offertory and join the community in celebrating the Liturgy of the Eucharist. CLOW is offered during the Faith Formation program year at the Sunday 9:00am and 11:00am Masses. Parents are always welcome to join their children if they want to check out our ministry. There is no prior registration or fee for participation.

# **FINDING GOD PROGRAM**

Grapes 1-6

Sundays 6:30-7:45pm, Wednesdays 4:30-5:45pm, or Wednesdays 6:30-7:45pm

Faith, Fun, and Friendships! The Finding God program option is open to children in grades 1-6. Children come together by grade level in small groups and are led by a trained catechist. The program takes the name from our curriculum Finding God: Our Response to God's Gifts by Loyola Press. This series supports children as they grow in their knowledge and understanding of the four pillars of our faith (Creed, Sacraments, Morality, and Christian Prayer). These timeless truths from the Catechism of the Catholic Church are taught every year on every grade level. The program also includes hands-on experiences of prayer, community and opportunities for service. We offer Random Acts of Kindness throughout the year as well as following the overall theme for Pax Christi. Our theme this year will be We Are Called to Serve based on Micah 6:8. In addition to the weekly sessions, parents and children will come together with those from other Faith Formation programs for Community Nights and other parish-wide events. Parents are urged to consider volunteering in the Finding God program as a catechist, aide, or other support role.

# SACRAMENT PREP: FIRST EUCHARIST

**GRADE 2 AND OLDER** 

The Sunday celebration of the Eucharist is the "source and summit" for our lives as Christians. Preparing children to come to the table of the Lord for the first time is a significant moment in their lives and the life of the community. Adequate preparation will also support their spiritual growth and make it clear that as they are nourished by the Eucharist, they are called to feed and serve others around them.

# **PAXCONNEX**

### Grapes 7-8

Sundays 6:30-7:45pm, Wednesdays 4:30-5:45pm, or Wednesdays 6:30-7:45pm

The Faith Formation department, along with members of the Middle School Faith Formation sub-committee, catechists, and current middle and high school youth, has been working hard researching, gathering information, and discussing many ideas to develop a middle school program that truly reflects the Mission, Vision, and Values of Pax Christi. The new program has been named PaxConnex to reflect the spirit of Pax Christi and the connection of our youth to our faith community.

PaxConnex will be a bridge between the Finding God/Good Shepherd programs and the High School Faith Interest Connectors program. Equal emphasis on the three movements of faith formation: Head (Knowledge), Heart (Passions), and Hands (Service and Justice) will be the catalyst for increasing our youth's knowledge in an engaging and meaningful way which will strengthen their relationship with the Church.

The **HEAD** component will focus on increasing knowledge of our Catholic faith and will follow a traditional faith formation classroom learning format. Seventh and eighth graders will gain a deeper understanding of Scripture, Creed, Sacraments, Prayer, Social Justice, and Catholic Morality.

The **HEART** component is being modeled after Pax Christi's successful Faith Interest Connectors program for our high school youth. In this section, they will partake in experiences that will connect them with parishioners and learn how our faith can be applied in their daily lives.

In the **HANDS** component, they will integrate their knowledge learned into action throughout the community by participating in service projects in our faith community and in the community at large, and then discussing the relationship between service and faith.

We are very excited to introduce PaxConnex to the parish and look forward to our youth becoming increasingly engaged with our faith community!

# **FAITH INTEREST CONNECTORS**

## Grapes 9-12

Sundays 6:30–7:45pm, Wednesdays 4:30–5:45pm, or Wednesdays 6:30–7:45pm

So, you're a teenager in high school. Life is crazy, complicated, wonderful, and full of stresses. Between friends, family, school, your job (if you have one), sports, activities, clubs, volunteering, thinking about college, and romantic relationships, you are pretty busy. Did you know your generation of teenagers is the busiest and most stressed out in US history? Anxiety and depression are fueled by stress. The lack of silence and rest leads to illness, restlessness, and a lack of focus.

So, why join Pax Christi's Sr. High Faith Formation program? It might seem like just another thing to add to the "busy list," but maybe there's something more to it.

Scientists have proven that people who are engaged in a faith community, adhere to a prayer practice, serve others, and find meaning in life through faith are happier, healthier, less stressed, and more successful in life.

Pax Christi's Sr. High Faith Formation is a network of youth and trusted adult leaders, small groups, events, service and justice projects, and exciting activities designed to help YOU make sense of life through the lens of faith.

Sr. High Faith Formation primarily takes place in Faith Interest Connector groups. Faith Interest Connectors (FICs) are short-term, small-group courses that combine passion-based learning with faith formation. FICs are an approach to faith formation that builds relationships via accompaniment in discipleship formation through a comprehensive and holistic methodology. Teenagers and adult leaders form FICs based on a shared interest (such as basketball, music, sciences, business, cooking, etc.). The typical FIC is six or seven weeks long, though some groups may continue to meet indefinitely as long as there is a desire to continue. Each week the groups explore a different theme of discipleship and something related to their interest topic. Members of the FICs work together to explore connections between faith and daily life using resources from the faith tradition, scripture, Christian practices, and culture. This kind of theological reflection allows youth and adults to examine ways to live as Christian disciples through their discoveries.

FICs help you *learn* about the Catholic faith, develop prayer practices to help you *grow in relationship with God*, and provide you the tools and opportunities to *put your faith into practice* through service and justice.

# SACRAMENT PREP: CONFIRMATION

### Grape 10 and older

**Are You Ready for Confirmation?** Preparation for the sacrament of Confirmation for high school youth at Pax Christi is available to students in 10th–12th grade. The preparation process begins in September and concludes in April with the celebration of Confirmation with the bishop. Those who are out of high school and wish to be confirmed are encouraged to inquire about the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults.

What is Confirmation? Confirmation is a sacrament of initiation originally part of the baptismal rite in the Early Church. When a newly baptized person emerged from the baptismal waters, he/she would be anointed with chrism oil by the Bishop, clothed in a white robe, and welcomed to the Eucharistic table. Today in the Archdiocese of St. Paul/Minneapolis, confirmation is typically the final sacrament of initiation for teenagers.

Confirmation is a moment of encounter with the Holy Spirit so that "believers are strengthened by power from heaven, made true witnesses of Christ in word and deed, and bound more closely to the Church" (from the introduction to the Rite of Confirmation).

The moment of Confirmation takes place within the celebration of Mass with the bishop. The sacrament of Confirmation is conferred through the anointing with chrism on the forehead, which is done by the laying on of the hand, and through the words: Be sealed with the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

Preparation for Confirmation is an opportunity to learn more about your faith and your parish community and to engage in service in the community and the world.

What Confirmation is Not: It's not a graduation. Confirmation is an initiation into the life of the Church and the Mission of God in the world.

It's not becoming an adult in the Church. Confirmation is becoming who you are meant to be at this particular moment in your life. You will become an adult in the Church when you become an adult (some of us are still working on this...).

**It's not a "Get Out of Church Free Card."** Confirmation is a commitment to involvement, participation, and responsibility in the local and global Catholic Church.

It's not something you should do just to appease your parents or grandparents. While your family may strongly encourage you to go through the preparation process for confirmation, it is ultimately your own decision to receive the sacrament of confirmation. Confirmation, while an efficacious grace from God, requires you to be open to the gifts and responsibilities that come with Confirmation.



What is Involved in the Preparation Process for Confirmation? At Pax Christi the process for the preparation for Confirmation includes these steps:

# 1. Pre-Preparation To Do List:

- a. Sign up for confirmation through the Faith Formation Registration Form
- b. Attend the Confirmation Orientation (August 30, 7pm)
- c. Complete the Candidate and Parent Introduction Essays
- d. Complete the Confirmation Information Form

## 2. Preparation Process:

- a. Participate in Faith Formation
- Participate in a Conversation Group 6 Online Learning Sessions, 3 Small Group Discussions
- Attend a Confirmation Retreat (3 date options: Oct 14–15, Nov 18–19, Dec 16–17)
- d. Serve in a Pax Christi Ministry/Service Group
- e. Find a Confirmation Sponsor and engage in sponsor-candidate conversations.
- f. Attend the Confirmation Celebration Rehearsal (TBD)

# 3. Attend the Confirmation Celebration at Pax Christi, Thursday, April 27, 2016

Why Should I Go Through the Preparation Process? The preparation for Confirmation gives you everything you need in order to make an informed decision about whether or not now is the right time to receive the sacrament. This process also gives you opportunities to build new friendships with peers, get to know Pax Christi better, and learn how to live as a fully initiated member of the Catholic Church.

# PASTORAL CARE IS ACTIVELY LISTENING

Listen with the ear of your heart. The first time I heard this well-known phrase of St. Benedict, I heard it deep in my soul. St. Benedict is teaching us that true listening involves more than just hearing words; it also includes what we feel in our heart. The Chinese characters which make up the verb "to listen" include ear and heart but also includes characters for you, eyes, and undivided attention. This is the kind of listening the Pax Christi Companion Ministers strive to do as they go out to visit parishioners and friends who are homebound and in need of a listening presence. Since listening is such an important component of ministry, we decided to discuss this topic of active listening at a recent monthly gathering.

Active listening is a skill that has to be taught and practiced since it requires techniques for us to use as we listen. We want to be attentive, observant, and engage our entire body, including our heart. It involves being in tune to the other person's feelings, words, and thoughts all at once. This can be done by watching for nonverbal clues, listening to the tone of the speech (language), and considering where the person's emphasis is during certain points in the conversation.

Most of us are much more familiar with passive listening. We listen to so many things in a day that we often think we're listening to someone when we're really distracted. This list of distractions seems endless: television, internet, radio, cell phones, Twitter, Snapchat, political banter ... even our own internal dialogue can get in the way. Not all listening can or needs to be active, but when we do take the time to block out distractions and avoid interjecting our own opinion, then listening becomes holy listening. Once listening moves into the realm of holy listening, we begin to uncover a person's story and bear witness to what he/she is trying to tell us or in many cases even understand for themselves.

My father is going through the stages of Alzheimer's, and as I listen to him, I notice how repetitive he has become. There are stories that are buried deep within him that helped shaped who he became, and even to this day, he remembers every little detail. As I listen to him, I often wonder what he's really trying to tell me. Rachel Naomi Remen says that story is just the container for meaning. Real stories take time and don't always have endings because they are retold time and time again. Real stories go beyond the details of the event to the actual feelings associated with it. My father's stories do change subtly over time, and I try to have the patience to listen for the deeper meaning. He challenges my active listening skills as he tries to communicate messages and lessons, not just words.

The Companion Ministers learned and discussed several practical ways we can be attentive to others while we listen, and these steps can easily be adapted to conversations you have with family, friends, and co-workers.

- Establish contact by looking at a person when he/she talks.
- Maintain a natural relaxed posture that indicates your interest.
- Clarify what he/she is saying rather than interjecting your personal assessment.
- Listen for themes or patterns that continue to surface.
- As much as possible, focus all your attention on the person speaking. Block out all physical, intellectual, and emotional distractions.

In our era of distractions and the current heated political discourse, I wonder how a dose of attentive, active listening would change the conversation. Written by Jean Thoresen, Director of Pastoral Care.

# MEMBER ENGAGEMENT – CHLOE AND TROY JOHNSON

When you have a chance, take a stroll through the St. Francis of the Woods area. You will see two great projects that are just being completed this summer. These two projects are unique in that they are both Scout achievement projects.

What makes them especially significant is that the Scouts are sister and brother. Chloe Johnson is completing our first Gold Award project, and Troy is working on his Eagle Scout rank. This is the first time we have had a brother and sister coordinate their Scouting achievement award activities on the Pax Christi Campus.

Troy began by creating a dry creek bed area that will control runoff and erosion around the paths. This is important because of the steep slopes and significant damage rainfalls have caused in this area. In the three years we have been re-landscaping the St. Francis area, we have had to rebuild sections of the paver path several times. The creek bed necessitated removal of a large section of the existing asphalt path. The area this creek bed protects is significant. There are large slopes, and a significant portion of the area above the creek bed is paved or otherwise impervious to water. Therefore, it was important to build a

creek bed that would protect the landscaped areas. Troy consulted with a parishioner who has some experience in designing just such a project. During the month of June, Troy led several people in the construction and completion of his entire project.

That brought up the need for a second project. Chloe Johnson stepped forward to offer a bridge construction to span the creek bed. It was important to design a bridge that would permit pedestrians to safely cross the creek bed and to allow small garden tractors to cross as well. This area is accessible all times of the day and night, so safety is an important aspect. Chloe consulted with a parishioner who has extensive experience in carpentry and outdoor building projects. Together, they designed a sturdy bridge frame with handrails and a closely matched contour to the original path. Chloe also plans to add some



engraving in the deck boards to reflect the contemplative nature of the area. Chloe's project is currently underway and is expected to be complete in late July or early August.

As you can see in these pictures, the result is something we can be proud of here at Pax Christi and is a significant accomplishment for these two young members of our church. They not only





have achieved impressive ranks in their scout troops but set a great example of engaged parishioners in our church.

Please stop by the St Francis area sometime this summer to see their great contribution to our campus.

# DON'T LET YOUR GIFTS GO DOWN THE RABBIT HOLE

I needed to weed and mulch the front garden at my house and set to work one hot weekend day a few weeks ago. When I got to the hosta section, I knew I didn't have to do much weeding, as they had grown to cover the whole end of the garden, so I ran my rake around the perimeter rather lackadaisically thinking about other things when all of a sudden, the hostas started quivering and quaking, and I stepped back unsure of what living thing I had disturbed. My mind quickly considered and rejected the scarier animals, that being snakes, mice, or rats, until I recognized the hopping motions of bunnies. Eight baby bunnies hopped, scattered, and jumped every which way out of their nest under the hostas. Mom was nowhere in sight, but the terrified bunnies made tracks in every direction. I admit I was frightened first at the sudden movement, then with the possibility that I had hurt or killed one of the bunnies with my rake. What's a gal to do? Of course, I went and got my husband and brother-inlaw to inspect as I could not look. No injured bunnies, but there were bunnies in the garage, something which my husband could not abide. I chased one bunny out and moved on to the mulching but will admit that I dumped the mulch over the former nest area and didn't spend any time patting it down as I was still suffering from bunny anxiety. Many hours later, I glanced outside, and there was the bunny mother. She sat outside the garden and just stared at the house. She sat there for hours. Her silent sentry filled my heart with guilt. Had I killed one of her brood and then covered it up with mulch? Was she plotting on how to get revenge for my actions? The next morning she was there again. I was starting to get nervous. I opened the door into the garage, and there in the middle of floor sat one of the bunnies. I opened all the doors and chased that bunny

for 20 minutes until the bunny hid behind a cupboard, and I gave up. At least I knew why mom was standing guard; she had a baby to gather. After work that evening, my husband managed to safely extract the baby bunny from the garage, and we haven't seen hide nor "hare" since.

So, what does this story have to do with Stewardship as a Way of Life? It's a great representation of how we make the plan of what we are going to do and start off. Then people, things, or in my case, animals, manage to create all sorts of havoc, jumbling up the perfectly orderly plan we had devised. In other words, life gets in the way. As a Christian Steward, we are called to accept the gifts we have been given, and all we have is gift from God. God is the silent sentry in the tale above. God is there for us, not only providing us with our gifts but then watching over us, always. We are asked to nurture our gifts, just like my weeding the garden. We are called to take our gifts and develop them, to make them grow and be fruitful. Sometimes that's when life's changes can come charging in, causing a move from the current plan A to plan B, C, or D. You may be challenged by family needs, job demands, health considerations, or just plain lack of enthusiasm to do the work to improve yourself. Your gifts sit there, under-utilized, needing your attention to thrive and grow. Without nurturing your gifts and learning how you can best utilize those gifts, there can be no next step towards generous sharing of the same gifts to those who could benefit from your talents. That call each of us received at Baptism is an urgent one, and our gifts can be just the perfect fit for somebody's need.
