Because of this unusual situation, you will receive the Pax Christi News magazine via email delivery starting with the July edition.

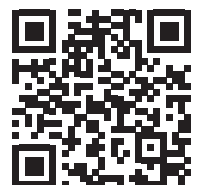

Dear Friends...

The very meaning of the word “neighbor” has been sorely challenged during the past few months because of the COVID-19 situation. At the very least, we have always thought of our neighbors as the people who live close to us (whether we happen to like them or not!). These days we are having to keep our physical distance, which doesn’t seem very neighborly at all. So perhaps this is a very good season to return to the more biblical meaning of that word. I’m sure you recall it.

In the gospels, when Jesus was asked by his audience to articulate the greatest commandment of religious law, he responded with not one but two of them: “Love the Lord your God entirely, and love your neighbor as yourself.” That’s the first lesson for us: We are not allowed to separate those responsibilities into different things. Failing to hold those two mandates together is to fail in our Christian baptismal commitment. If that seems obvious to you, it apparently isn’t to some, on both sides of the coin. On one hand, I think we’ve all met people who claim to love God but don’t have a lot of time to look out for the welfare of their neighbor. For them, religion is a very private, individualistic thing. I’m tempted to call it selfish, strange as that idea may sound. On the other hand, we find people who are very altruistic and generous

in service to their neighbors but who don’t seem to be able to connect that good work with a necessary adherence to God and common worship. That also is something other than what Jesus taught.

But then comes the clarifying question put to Jesus in the scriptures: “And who IS my neighbor?” As He did so often, Jesus declined to give a pat answer. Instead He told a story, in this case the parable about the Good Samaritan. It was the story about the man who was beaten and robbed and left to die on the roadside in Israel, and who was ignored by the “religious” people there but was cared for by a foreign traveler, a Samaritan.

This, He told us, is your neighbor, the one in trouble. You may not even know his name or his history, but you know of his need. If you love God, do something.

This is our conviction still at Pax Christi, as we continue to dedicate ourselves to the work of service, justice, charity, and welcome. The neighbor is the vulnerable person whom we encounter, who may or may not live next door or even in the next town. To be neighborly is to be deeply Christian. We have a whole lot of vulnerability going on these days, whether physical, emotional, spiritual, or psychological. It’s an invitation for us to pay attention, in whatever ways we can, so as to be faithful to that first and greatest commandment.

Six Feet Apart and Close at Heart

Driving around the Eden Prairie area these days, one quickly notices a lot of new construction going on. Several of the larger projects are additional senior communities or expansions of current campuses. As our population ages, the search for senior housing is on the rise and it's easy to understand why seniors would pick this community. Some move here to be closer to their families, but many others come because they appreciate all that Eden Prairie has to offer. We welcome them all and love seeing our community grow and flourish.

The St. Paul/Minneapolis archdiocese has an effective model for pastoral ministry which divides up communities into what is referred to as a canonical boundary. All Catholics within that boundary are under the care of the local church for their sacramental and spiritual needs regardless of their home parish affiliation. Pax Christi currently has nine care centers that we include in our parish family. Prior to COVID-19, many of the care center residents would regularly join us for Mass, and for those who couldn't venture out, we have a team of about 35 shared ministers who assisted at on-site Masses, presided at Word and Communion Services, provided Eucharistic visits, and enjoyed face-to-face pastoral visits. All of that came to a halt in mid-March with the shelter-in-place order, so we've had to become more creative as we strive to stay connected.

Within hours of receiving word that Pax Christi offices were closing, I had several people approach me wondering how we could stay socially and spiritually linked with our senior neighbors in this time of physically distancing. Renee Dignan, Preschool/Elementary Coordinator, peeked her head into my office and asked if there was a way we could collaborate on a project. We both agreed that while this virus is a collective plight, not all are sharing the same experience. Families would be looking for creative ways to keep their children busy, while our senior residents were going to be isolated and likely worried. A plan was hatched. Renee and I work together each Christmas to go caroling at the care centers with arms full of homemade gifts, so this was a natural collaboration. Within days we had *Operation Pax Cares* in action and Renee coined the phrase, "six feet apart and close at heart." Other Faith Formation staff joined in and asked families to send cards and artwork to all nine of our care centers.

Meanwhile, I worked with staff to create phone calling trees. Callers were given a list of names and phone numbers of our elders and asked to check-in with them, pray, share the news about the Live Streaming of Mass, and make note of any prayer requests they may have. Many of these callers have created an ongoing bond and calls continue weekly. I have been receiving such lovely feedback from everyone.

Card makers said:

Having a brother/uncle with a developmental disability, we understand how isolating and difficult this time can be for those in the disability community. Hopefully we could bring some sunshine to others' day by sending some happy kid art. -Meredith

We had fun sitting at the kitchen table doing this. My seven-year-old girls Maeve and Genevieve love doing art...we hope it brought a little happiness to those who received them. -Ingrid

Two care centers emailed with words of gratitude:

It's been such an encouraging joy for me to deliver those letters of love to our folks who are lonesome. Thank your volunteers for continuing to be the beautiful hands and feet of Jesus and reflecting His love with each and every generous gesture! -Kari, staff

People have their cards hung up on a wall, one person has their card on a bulletin board. She said, "It is the first thing I see when I go out to get my mail. It brightens my day." -Anna, staff

Callers said:

I have gone through my list and must say that these people are absolutely delightful...and so positive! They made my heart happy. -Becky

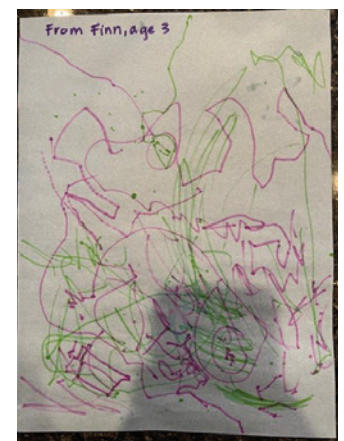
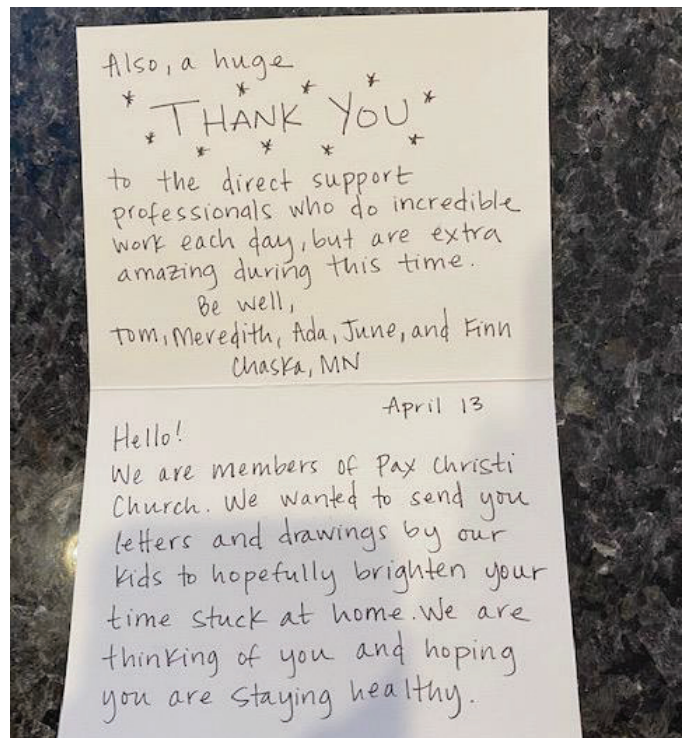
I completed my phone calling today. Some of my conversations were 20 to 25 minutes long! I enjoyed listening to stories about their families and their lives. -Cindy

Both the card sending, and phone calling initiatives have delivered God's grace and blessings to the doors of our neighbors. When asked how we can witness our faith under these current conditions, I say pick up a pen or a phone and just begin.

Some of our elders have lived through the depression, wars, and other times of isolation, and they will tell you that while it does form a shadow over the community, if you look for the light you will notice that it leaves a path for a new way forward. Together we will define how that path leads us to positive changes and creative answers to some of our toughest issues. I am confident we will adapt to these new needs and find ways to provide ministry and serve others under the power and guidance of the Holy Spirit.
