


























A NEW START!

IT'S JANUARY, and the New Year has just arrived. Thanks be to God that we survived another holiday season. It now extends from Halloween (it's just not for kids anymore) through Thanksgiving — feasting and football — and concludes with the great American shop-athon, Christmas. Maybe you didn't succumb to all of the allurements promised in the commercials and online. You might have even actually enjoyed being around family and friends over for dinner and out for office parties. But now that's over, at least in the popular American imagination. But not for us as men and women of faith in Jesus Christ. Our liturgical year, which began a month ago, follows its own rhythm and flow. So the twelve days of Christmas, starting on the 25th of December, don't conclude until January 6, the feast of Epiphany or the Three Kings. And if you really want to retain our older tradition, it can be stretched out until February 2nd when we celebrate the feast of the Presentation of Jesus in the temple. was the prescribed period of forty days after the birth of a first-born son when the child would be offered up to God in publically acknowledging a new

member of God's holy people.

Epiphany is a more important feast than Christmas. I heard this as a child, I could scarcely believe my ears. Christmas was the most important day of the year when Baby Jesus was born and we got lots of presents and candy! In fact, Christmas is only the fourth most important feast in the Church. Easter is the obvious winner, hands down. No resurrection and we would still be going to the synagogue! Then comes Pentecost, the birthday of the Church. Without this community we wouldn't have the New Testament or any great feasts. Then comes Epiphany. Could this be because many European countries and Latin America celebrate giftgiving on this feast? This is their "Christmas" display of generosity. But theologically it is more universal in its meaning. Christmas was a familycentered event. Only a few of the neighbors, the shepherds, were invited to this event. With the arrival of the wise men, the kings, whoever they really were, this was the wider public, the world, the gentiles — us, getting a look at this Messiah. He was coming, not just for a few but for everyone. He was God the Father's gift to humanity.

But what I find interesting is that you can only find out about this event in the Gospel of Matthew. In fact the gospels offer us very little information about this part of Jesus' life. Mark and John don't even begin with the infancy narrative. They start with a young Jewish man coming out of a small village and starting to preach a new understanding of God. Luke, who is concerned with the poor, women and gentiles, tells the story of the shepherds. His gospel actually gives us more of the stories of Jesus' infancy and childhood. But even then we have just a couple of chapters on this. It's Matthew who tells the story of the Magi that has always been a bit of a mystery to me. Matthew is the most Jewish of the four gospels. He quotes the Old Testament, the Jewish scriptures, more than the other three combined. Obviously his audience was familiar with them. So why focus on this story about the gentiles who came to honor the King of the Jews? But some other points of the story seem puzzling. If Joseph was of the house of King David, why wasn't he staying with relatives in Bethlehem? Middle Eastern hospitality demanded such openness, especially to family members. But had he ever been to Bethlehem before? One summer when I worked at a large parish in Lagos, Nigeria, I met many people who had lived their whole life in that sprawling city of millions. But when they spoke of their hometown, they



were speaking oftentimes of a small village in another part of the country. This was their ancestral home, even if they had never been there or only visited it on a few occasions. And what about the Star of Bethlehem that the Magi followed. When I worked at the Newman Center, Professor Karlis Kaufmanis was renowned for his famous "Star of Bethlehem" talk which he gave hundreds of times over the years. It wasn't so much a guiding star as one that informed the world or those who could read the signs. It was a unique constellation that said that there was a new king born among the Jews. So you go to the king, Herod, and ask him about it. This is how you get to the city of David, Bethlehem, and later cause chaos and heartache for the Holy Family and others. So Matthew was telling his audience and us that Jesus was the fulfillment of all the promises that God had made to his people, the Jews, and to all of humanity.

Yet in this New Year, we can be on a journey like the wise men. They went in search not of adventure but of discovering someone new. Who or what that could be were a mystery to them. But they brought gifts and came to see what they could learn and do — for others and for themselves. This is also a good plan of operation for each and every one of us here at Pax Christi. We have just finished collecting food, clothing, and other household supplies for many people in need of basic necessities of life. There will be more opportunities during the coming months to help other individuals and families. But it isn't just about giving something. There are many opportunities through Pastoral Care and Social Justice that call us on a journey to step outside of our comfort zone and experience a new world that can bring some rewards to our life. One of the positive rewards for "risking," or trying something new is that we discover new things about ourselves like strengths, talents, and skills that we never knew we had. Even an old (or mature) dog can learn a few new tricks or skills. We also discover that we have much to



offer. So often we short change ourselves into thinking that we have nothing of importance to share or give. As I have said many times from the pulpit, our two most important gifts are those of ourselves and the irreplaceable gift of time. Both are personal and unique. We also open ourselves up to receive from others. When I started to preach in Spanish while living in Bolivia, I would sometimes grapple for a word. In those small communities worshipping in neighborhood chapels, the people would help me by speaking up and giving me the word I was looking for. As an American, I had so much, so what could they give me? It wasn't just a word or two but their love and help. We truly do

need each other, no matter who we are or where we are from.

If you are willing to start a new journey this New Year by getting involved in a new ministry, program, or activity here at the parish and beyond, I know that you will find something surprising and yet obvious. Like the Magi, you might "travel" far from home, your safe or comfort But when you come to the end of another year, I believe that you will find that you are not lost or wandering around aimlessly. Instead you will find that you are still home, it's just that it's a new home which you have helped to build with the help of new brothers and sisters!



PAX CHRISTI TRAVELS

I LOVE words like quest, journey, pilgrimage, travel. They are such active words conjuring up the image of both going out into the world and searching within ourselves.

Maybe my love of travel is why I'm so touched by the variety of crèches we see this time of year in homes, on front yards, and on greeting cards. Everyone in the scene has traveled afar, some on a quest and some out of necessity. Mary and Joseph, due to a census requirement, have to travel out of necessity. Although the story tells us that it's to the land of Joseph's ancestors, we have no reason to believe he has ever been to this place. They arrive in a strange land, with less than ideal accommodations, and yet an incredible transformation occurs. In addition, the shepherds are changed forever when they take a risk on their journey by leaving their herd behind so they can travel to this place. And of course the Magi travel the farthest and are certainly on a quest. The familiar carol tells us of their story:

We three kings of Orient are, bearing gifts we traverse afar. Field and fountain, moor and mountain, following yonder star. O star of wonder, star of night, star with royal beauty bright, Westward leading, still proceeding, guide us to thy perfect Light.

Tradition tells us that the Magi had heard about the coming of a King and then felt compelled to find Him. They follow a star which provided light for their quest. They spent a great deal of resources, traveled a great distance, and placed themselves at personal risk to seek Him. Once they found Him, the Wise Men did more than just bow down to Jesus; they "... fell down, and worshipped Him: and when they had opened their treasures, they presented unto Him gifts; gold, and frankincense, and myrrh," (Matthew 2:11).

Like each person in the Nativity story, we are called to go out and offer our treasures. Pope Francis urges us to "go forth" with a "missionary impulse" to seek out God's children and open up our treasures. Our gifts may be the healing power of prayer and sacraments through Pax Christi care center volunteers, listening and offering words of support through our Spirituality and Mental Wellness group, the unconditional love of an animal in our Pet Visit ministry, the gift of presence by volunteering in Funeral or Companion Ministry. In order to encounter people where they need us, it may require that we travel out of our comfort zone and from our predictable routine into the unknown. At first, we may feel lonely, but we will soon discover that we are not alone. Our own personal crèche scene is created as others come to join us with their own treasures.

Fr. Richard Rohr encourages us to begin anew this New Year: This feast of Epiphany, or the manifestation, shows us that God is manifest, is visible, is evident to us. God is shown forth wherever people are searching for love and light and truth...So as we begin a new year, let us challenge ourselves to be wise men and wise women. Let us journey with eyes searching to see the light, to see the truth, to see the love, to see the goodness — wherever it is found, by whatever name it carries. Let this be the year we, like the wise men, are willing to go on the same kind of stretching and perilous journeys to find the God that is always present and freely given to all.

The next few articles highlight several Pastoral Care ministries that happen on a daily basis but are hidden in our midst. As you read these, know that you are invited to join us on our journey.

HIDDEN TREASURES IN OUR VOLUNTEERS

PASTORAL CARE has many opportunities for its volunteers to contribute to the life and work of the church. Many of the volunteers are hidden from sight yet faithfully answer the call to serve behind the scenes.

One such volunteer is Sara Byerley, who volunteers her time in the Companion Ministry, as a Communion Minister at local Care Centers, and is a co-founder of the Pax Pets Ministry. In addition, Sara has served on the Pastoral Care Council. A convert to Catholicism, Sara was a deacon in a non-denominational church before converting to Catholicism in 1994. She and her spouse joined Pax Christi in 2009. She felt God's call or directive to reach out to people who needed pastoral care. "Everyone needs a smile, someone to listen to them as they are struggling with life issues," Sara says. The volunteers in Pastoral Care are part of a group at Pax Christi who feel in communion

with others and offer care and support in many ways to those who are homebound, suffering loss of a loved one, have a serious illness, or are experiencing stresses too difficult to bear alone. "People do not need to feel they are alone, forgotten, unsupported by this faith community."

Sara says this about the Companion Ministry: "I receive more blessings than I ever give." Sara has met people of different backgrounds and made new friends. This is a two-way street. You need to sit and listen. You need to talk. Companion Ministry offers connections and support. "It's a great way to help people and give something to those who need support, both in our Catholic community and the community at large." Companion Ministers care, reach out, and listen.


Sara highly recommends "reaching out to others as part of membership in Pax Christi Catholic Community and as a follower of Jesus Christ."

Funeral Hospitality has a dynamic member active for over twenty years in the person of Earl Smith. Quite by accident, his wife Jeanne took Earl away from a round of golf to come to help her serve lunch after a funeral at Pax Christi. Together they served on this hospitality committee for several years. Earl liked that they could do it together as a couple. "It is a good cause," he says. At 89 years of age, Earl continues volunteering in this ministry though Jeanne passed away in 2000. "It is a good way for families to reminisce after the funeral, tell stories about the person who has died, and support each other a little longer."

It is a lot of work setting up the tables and chairs for lunch, so Earl gets to Pax Christi a bit early before the others arrive to do the food preparation and set the tables. He wants to be certain everything is ready for the guests. The father of four sons, Earl appreciates the care given when a loved one dies. He has buried Jeanne and a grandson, so he knows how much people appreciate the hospitality given by the Funeral Hospitality Committee.

"The volunteers are great to work with. You always make new friends this way. It is a dedicated team that shows hospitality to those grieving. Blessed are those who mourn for they shall be comforted."

HIDDEN TREASURE OF OUR CARE CENTER VISITORS

GO IN PEACE to love and serve the world. The directive is clear. The response can be challenging. Each time we attend Mass, to be nourished by Word and Sacrament, we are instructed "to go forth" and do likewise. The gospels are full of examples of Jesus visiting the sick, healing the hurting, and loving all people. Encouraged by the Word of God and motivated by example, Pax Christi has over 40 dedicated volunteers who go forth each week to love and serve at area care centers.

Hidden from our view, they go out into our community each week to offer prayer and companionship to those in need. Some bring the Eucharist to those who are unable to attend Mass, some prepare monthly Communion services to share Word and Sacrament, some provide music at care center Masses, and others assist residents in wheelchairs and walkers so they can attend these services. All are responding to the directive to love and serve by sharing their treasures of faith, hope, and love with those who are sick, aged, or dying.

"When the Church cares for the sick, it serves Christ himself in the suffering members of the Mystical Body." Pax Christi offers Mass monthly at Castle Ridge, The Colony, and Friendship Village. Communion services are provided weekly or monthly at Elim Shores, Summit Place, Dungarvin Homes, Pioneer Estates, and Brookdale Senior Living.

"In bringing Communion to them [sick, aged, dying] the minister of Communion represents Christ and manifests faith and charity on behalf of the whole community toward those who cannot be present at the Eucharist. For the sick the reception of Communion is not only a privilege but also a sign of support and concern shown by the Christian community for its members who are ill" (USCCB).

SPIRITUALITY AND MENTAL WELLNESS GROUP

FRENCH PHILOSOPHER and Jesuit priest Teilhard de Chardin has said, We are not human beings having a spiritual experience; we are spiritual beings having a human experience.

The wisdom of de Chardin starts with the premise that we are by nature spiritual, and our spirituality is based in believing that we are formed by a Creator who fashions us to "live fully."

At Pax Christi we have a Mental Health and Spirituality group that has been meeting monthly for over 12 years and values the spirituality of our tradition based in wellness and thriving. The group aims to address the spiritual dimension of human beings, providing a holistic approach to healing. A key part of this understanding is based on our belief in the Paschal Mystery which contains key moments of hardship, conflict, struggle, judgments, and painful events, and is a description of human experience. We also have life moments of reconciliation, peace and joy, where we feel we are resurrected. Jesus showed us how to use our "spirit to overcome" to believe that full life is possible.

With the premise that spirituality creates mental wellness, the Mental Health and Spirituality group, with the encouragement of de Chardin's words, re-envisioned itself and, through prayer and reflection, became the "Spirituality and Mental Wellness Group." This group aims to provide spiritual, supportive, and educational growth opportunities for its members.

Facilitator John Reardon, MA, certified Adlerian Counselor and State Registered Mental Health Worker, says, "This ministry provides a respectful place to explore the struggles, doubts, the fears that are part of our human experience. The group goes through this struggle together as equal members and attempts to find a sense of normalcy where we all know that people are working on adjusting to challenges, and using their courage and energy to live more fully."

HIDDEN TREASURE OF PAX PET VISIT MINISTRY


THE DREAM is now a reality. Pax's Pet Ministry teams are going out from Pax Christi, bringing comfort to people who need their days brightened. After successfully completing the training to become members of Pax's Pet Visit Ministry, my dog Emmy and I are proud to be one of the nine pet teams who visit Dungarvin Homes, Friendship Village, Brookdale Memory Care, or Grace Hospice, visiting up to 20 residents at a time.

Twice a week Emmy gets dolled up. Her coat gets shampooed and brushed, and her face, ears, and paws cleaned with puppy wipes. She knows the words 'go to work' and that my bag is full of treats for her. When her Pax Pets red bandanna gets tied around her neck, she is ready to go.

Before we started our visits, I shadowed some of the other teams to learn the routine. Each dog has a special gift to give. Cheryl's dog Wilson has his favorite people he is eager to visit. Tammy's dog Elsie sits on people's feet, leans her back against their legs, and throws her head up for loving. Imagine how nice that feels to people who don't get many touches. Jennifer's dog Bella has a coat of pure silk to pet and likes to watch television in between visits, giving everybody a laugh. Even residents who are slightly afraid of dogs or don't have the mobility to pet her feel they get a visit when my Emmy sits quietly, maintaining intense eye contact with her golden eyes.

While the residents we see blossom from our visits, I learn about the resiliency of people and to deeply respect each one I meet, treating them with the dignity they deserve no matter where they are on life's journey. Steve and Yanmei Anderson came together from Minnesota and Beijing, China. Yanmei tells how her prayer was answered after doctors had told them they would never have children. Yanmei and their daughter Zoe were both baptized at Pax Christi six years ago. Because of her faith, Yanmei's sister in China has now become a Christian.

As we come to worship together, it's amazing to think how many miles some have journeyed. But whether we originate five miles or 5,000 miles from here, we know that the door is open, and we are all welcomed as daughters and sons in the Kingdom, the Church.
