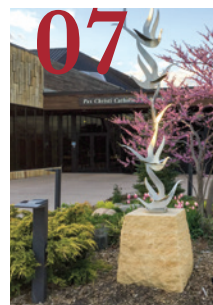

Dear Friends...

You may have noted the news coverage last month of a letter that was sent by Archbishop Hebda to the priests of our archdiocese in which he counseled them not to vote in the primary election. At first I was startled to receive it, but I was persuaded by its prudent wisdom. Under the rules of primary election balloting in Minnesota, one can only cast a vote if he/she first identifies as a member of a political party. And while one's specific vote is not public information, the data about party affiliation is gathered and forwarded to leadership, who are able to make it as public as they choose to. Thus, it would be entirely possible that my name (and yours) could be disclosed as being a so-called "registered" Democrat or Republican merely for having shown up to vote. It was the archbishop's judgment, and indeed that of all the bishops of Minnesota, that this could compromise the ability of priests to minister effectively amid the communities they serve. Political tags, especially in these deeply divided days, often have the effect of driving wedges and animosity between people.

Our Catholic church is not beholden to one party or another, but is rather one of the few communities that can be an agent of unity rather than ideological warfare. Nor does the Church per-

se have any control over the definition of what it means to be a member of a specific party at a given moment in time. So there's a certain required sacrifice of some of our religious integrity by being forced to align with one party or another. Obviously the archbishop's letter could not have ordered me to stay home on primary day, but in fact I did

not vote. (OK, full disclosure: I was away on vacation on primary day, out of state, and I had neglected to take care of getting an absentee ballot in advance). O happy fault.

Another American archbishop, Robert McElroy of San Diego, recently gave an important lecture in which he touched upon the responsibility that every Catholic voter has to be thoughtful and discerning in coming to the voting booth. Among his observations is that nobody votes for a party on election day; we vote for a candidate. And any candidate is bound to carry around a very mixed bag of positions and passions and policies, some of which may conform nicely with the gospel of Jesus Christ and others of which may be more nearly antithetical to it—all in the same person. It is a time-honored strategy for a politician to equate himself/herself with the ideals of both party and country, so as to create the impression that to vote one way or another is a test of loyalty to both institutions. But for a thoughtful Christian that's a trap for the reasons that Archbishop McElroy stated. The abstract ideals of the United States of America are, for the most part, honorable (if they were perfect, we wouldn't have amendments to our Constitution), but actual political leaders of all kinds frequently are not neatly conformed to them. And in the case of both major political parties, many of the ideals themselves are not honorable from a Christian point of view.

So we make our church too small when we allow any political party or person to usurp our responsibility to be gospel-bearing citizens. And we distort our mission when we attempt to make the story of Jesus Christ "fit" too neatly into the political landscape of life or to subordinate it to any merely human ideology—any.

Archbishop Hebda's letter to priests raises an issue that applies just as much to every other member of the Christian community. If we are responsible citizens, we cannot avoid selecting one candidate or another when we vote, but we cannot allow that decision to define us as disciples of Christ.

Pax Christi's Men's Group Offers Opportunities for Growth

The Pax Christi Men's Group was formed in July 2019 in response to input that was received during a breakfast gathering for men earlier in the year. Their mission is to provide an environment where men feel comfortable sharing their ideas, issues, and perspectives to enhance their own spiritual/faith development and growth. They have identified a number of objectives they seek to fulfill, which include:

- to provide a safe, comfortable environment for the open exchange of issues, ideas, and learning
- to be respectful of each other without any judgments
- to provide a forum to share techniques and ideas to improve our spiritual/faith growth and increased levels of personal performance
- to provide an environment where all discussions are kept CONFIDENTIAL, treated with RESPECT, and are SUPPORTIVE of our fellow man
- to develop trusted associates both within and outside of the group
- to enhance our spiritual and human growth opportunities
- to develop new friends and have fun!

Over the past year, the group has held a number of gatherings. Some have featured guest speakers, such as Fr. Mike Byron, Fr. Steve McMichael, and Deacon Charles Bobertz on topics relevant to men. Other gatherings have been centered around viewing and discussing a video featuring noted speakers such as Fr. Richard Rohr and Jordan Peterson. In an ideal gathering, the group sees great value in learning from the insights and experiences of one another, so time is generally set aside for small group conversation and faith-sharing.

Going forward, the group hopes to have their next gathering on Thursday, May 14, from 6:30-8:00pm. They are also looking at ways to equip smaller groups of men to gather together for faith sharing activities such as bible studies, service outings, prayer groups, retreats, etc., as they realize that in a parish community such as ours, a "one size fits all" model does not meet the various needs and stages of development in the spiritual journey that is found at Pax Christi.

It is the sincere desire of the Men's Ministry Core Team that more men will get involved with the various activities and opportunities that are offered in the future. Lifelong Faith Formation

Spiritual Growth Requires both Roots and New Perspectives

When I began to reflect on spiritual growth, one of the core values of Pax Christi, I realized that I felt somewhat unqualified to write about it. I felt that if my spirituality was a plant, it would look more like a seedling than a fully-grown crop; something not yet ready to be harvested and shared with others.

Last spring I participated in the sacrament of Confirmation and for the 13 years prior, I attended weekly faith formation classes. Currently I am an elementary school catechist, participant in high school faith formation events, and member of the Lifelong Faith Formation Council. Even after being confirmed, I have chosen to stay involved in faith formation because I truly believe in the opportunity it provides for growth. However, as I consider spirituality as a whole, I often feel like a bit of an amateur.

I am beginning to realize that this feeling may not be the result of a faulty catechesis or lack of experience with spirituality, but rather a flawed conceptualization of how this growth actually works. We tend to think of spiritual growth as a linear process. It is more convenient to accept the idea that certain practices will automatically and consistently produce certain consolations. It is less tidy to believe that spiritual insight, connection, and growth may not always happen in ways or times that we expect.

Any kind of growth, spiritual or botanic, requires some consistency. However, every plant and every person is different and needs different things depending on the season. We stay rooted through liturgy, community, and prayer, but necessary growth is found outside of our comfort zones. Learning to communicate, reflect, live, and pray in new ways is a practice of patience and this mindset is true spiritual growth. Rotating our perspectives and spiritual practices creates space for wisdom and insight.

Instead of dwelling on how early I am on the line of spiritual growth, or viewing Confirmation as a “graduation” from spiritual development, I am choosing to believe in a spirituality that is alive and evolving along with every other aspect of my life. I am embracing my spirituality as it is and choosing to pursue an attitude of openness when connecting with the divine. I am learning to view mystery as a beautiful depth of opportunity, because spiritual growth is a lifelong process.

Your summer volunteer efforts can help feed people in need around the corner or around the world. Whether you prefer the outdoors or indoors, working individually or with a group, there are a number of ways to volunteer this summer.



Giving Garden

If you enjoy spending time outside, consider putting on a pair of garden gloves and joining a committed group of amateur gardeners at the Giving Garden. Since 2012, the Giving Garden on the Pax Christi campus has been used to grow fresh produce to donate to the PROP community food shelf. Annually, more than 1,200 pounds of fresh vegetables are harvested to provide nutritious food to Eden Prairie and Chanhassen-area families.

The Giving Garden is truly a community effort, with volunteers helping to plan and prepare for the garden in April, plant seeds and seedlings in mid to late May, weed, water, pick, and deliver vegetables to PROP from June to September. Gardeners as young as age five accompanied by a parent are welcome, and anyone age 12 and older is welcome to volunteer independently or as part of a group. Regular work times are established each year with the goal of creating a community of gardeners. This summer there will be two, one-hour time slots scheduled each week beginning in May—one during the day, and one in the evening. Many volunteers are a part of the effort, with some giving their time every week and some more occasionally. Feed My Starving Children (FMSC)

FMSC has three permanent sites in Minnesota, including nearby Chanhassen, where anyone age five and older can help pack MannaPack™ meals for impoverished children around the world. The meals are formulated to reverse and prevent undernutrition so that children can thrive and meet their full potential. Volunteers pack meals during two-hour shifts, preceded by a 15-minute orientation. With handicap-accessible facilities and jobs for those who need to be seated, this is an opportunity for just about anyone. Children ages five to 18 can participate, as long as they are accompanied by an adult. High Schoolers can receive documentation for volunteer hours. FMSC does not require a minimum number of participants, so check out the volunteer tab on the FMSC website to register yourself, your family, or a group of friends. Because of the COVID-19 outbreak, we encourage you to check the FMSC website to see available reservation times during the coming months, along with updates. If you make a reservation and that packing session is canceled, you will receive an email notification. More information can be found on the website: FMSC.org.

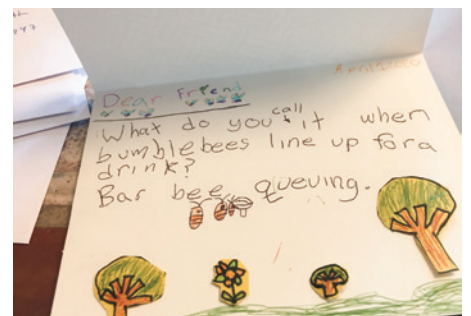
