























IT IS RIGHT AND JUST

"WHAT does the Lord require of you but to do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with God?" (Micah 6:8). My thoughts return to this key passage as we begin the new year. Micah the prophet puts flesh on our parish's annual theme, We Are Called to Serve. Justice, kindness, and humility — this is who we are as Catholics. This month I want to reflect on justice in our lives.

To some, the word justice has a harsh ring to it. "Justice" can carry a sense of penalties and punishment, of law courts and law suits, of cold legal precision. Maybe Law and Order or Blue Bloods come to mind. One of my friends remembers one of the earliest memories of justice in his household: when his mother gave a treat to her sons, one brother got to split it with a knife, but the other brother got to choose which part was his. This invariably produced slices of cake and pie that were divided with laserlike accuracy! Fifty-fifty. It was fair and square.

The bible, however, has a much broader vision of justice. Justice is more than simply a line that divides what is yours from what is mine. Classically, justice is defined as giving to another what is due to him or her. And that's not wrong. But God invites his people to do justice by

eagerly and generously giving to others that which will make them flourish. Biblical justice, coming to full fruition in Jesus Christ, reveals that my flourishing is intimately bound up with the flourishing of all. Saint James tell us:

What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? If a brother or sister has nothing to wear and has no food for the day, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, keep warm, and eat well," but you do not give them the necessities of the body, what good is it? So also faith of itself, if it does not have works, is dead (2:14-17).

If I want to truly be a person of justice, then I recognize that I am always and everywhere personally involved with my neighbor. Our faith that God has created all of us with immense dignity summons us to works of justice. In the scripture, justice is essentially the same as righteousness, and righteousness is being in the right relationship with God and with one another.

Our Catholic social tradition bears several hallmarks that help us to be faithful to God's call. Three exemplary pillars are the dignity of human life, the preferential option for the poor, and the universal destination of goods.

The dignity of each and every human person, from conception until death, is the foundation of a just and functioning society. Our call to justice demands that we never treat anyone as a means to an end – no matter how important that end might appear. Instead, we show by our words and actions that every person is created by God with incalculable worth. Every person deserves to be respected, treasured, loved. The most basic respect for human dignity comes in the shape of the right to life, without which all other rights become false and illusory, as St. John Paul II taught so beautifully in his life and ministry.

The preferential option for the poor is also a hallmark of our heritage of faith. From the beginning of the Bible, the Lord shows his preferential concern for the poor, the weak, and marginalized; "he rescues the poor when they cry out, the oppressed who have no one to help" (Psalm 72:12). We are called to work for the common good of all, but at the same time we put special energy into helping those who are seen as worthless by the world. Pope Francis has reminded the Church that we must never give into the throw-away culture that not only destroys the planet but also destroys people.

Finally, the Church has continually borne witness to the universal destination of goods. While private property is legitimate, the Second Vatican Council also restated that "In his use of things man should regard the external goods he legitimately owns not merely as exclusive to himself but common to others also, in the sense that they can benefit others as well as himself." That means that the homes we inhabit, the things we own, the churches in which we worship, and the companies which we manage are never ends

in themselves but are meant to help others to flourish. Christians should be wisely ignorant of anything "selfenclosed!"

We can examine our hearts and ask ourselves if we are living out God's justice in a minimalist way or if we are living out God's justice in a biblical way: In our lives, how do we help others to flourish? How do we see one another with the eyes of God, who always desires us to grow into the men and women he calls us to be? Where in my life do I do justice

to my neighbor only with the minimum level of fairness? Can I see the call of Christ — to do justice — only as a debt to pay, or as an opportunity to be his instrument of upbuilding, blessing, and elevating others? Will I let Christ's justice abide in me?

As you continue reading this month's magazine, I hope you are lifted up and inspired by the stories of how Pax Christi answers the call to do justice.

BLESSED TRINITY

Blessed Trinity Catholic School, the only Catholic school in Richfield, is a faith-based school which focuses on learning of the whole child. The student population is diverse. Forty percent of the student body does not have English as their primary language.

Grant Objectives: Provide substantial scholarships to low-income families needing extended day programming to ensure access to Catholic education and continued academic growth and success.

The extended day program is a valuable asset to the community and to the school. It draws students to the school who might otherwise not be attending Blessed Trinity. In all cases, the families would not have been able to choose Blessed Trinity without the option of extended care. There is a waiting list to enroll.

Principal Patrick O'Keefe said "Blessed Trinity Catholic School could not support this program without the grant from Pax Christi Justice Board! We are very grateful and thank you for your support."

CABRINI

CABRINI, a program of Project for Pride in Living (PPL), helps adults experiencing homelessness, mental illness, and chemical dependency find and keep housing, and reach educational, employment, health, family, and community support goals. Cabrini serves over 200 single adults each year, addressing housing as a basic human right and offering integrated services that address the cause and consequences of chronic homelessness.

The Pax Christi grant helps Cabrini, through community support, respond to individual emergencies, provides participants with basic household supplies, assures adequate housing access and support, and addresses the stigma and isolation of homelessness and mental illness.

Members of Pax Christi have volunteered with Cabrini's holiday program and committee membership, and Pax Christi's Twelve Baskets Ministry has provided Welcome Home Baskets.

Centro Guadalupano at Holy Rosary Church: A source of hope and opportunity for immigrants and refugee families since 2000.

CRISTO REY _____

Cristo Rey Jesuit High School is one of 32 nationwide schools run by Jesuit priests. Free education and transportation is provided for children of low income families. Opened in 2007 with 100 students, the school has grown dramatically and is at full capacity. One hundred percent of students have graduated high school and been accepted into college, while 71% are currently active in 2/4 year programs. The school requires students to work one day a week for corporate sponsors which covers over 50% of the yearly student cost. Pax Christi has supported the program since its in ception.

RISEN CHRIST _____

Risen Christ Catholic School was formed in 1993 as a consolidation of five area parish schools: Holy Name, St. Stephen's, St. Albert the Great, Incarnation, and Holy Rosary. Risen Christ currently serves 325 students in grades K-8, with more low-income students (96%) and a higher percentage of Latino students (88%) than any other Catholic school in the Twin Cities. As the cost to educate each child far exceeds the capacity of these families to pay tuition, funding, in addition to volunteer hours from organizations such as Pax Christi, allows these children to break the cycle of poverty and become the leaders of tomorrow.

SMALL SUMS _____

Small Sums is a non-profit organization in St. Paul. Their mission is to support homeless individuals who have found jobs, with the required work clothes and shoes, trade tools, professional licenses or union dues, and bus passes, giving them reliable transportation to work for the first few months of employment. The program is committed to assisting them in their efforts to find stable housing and to become self-sufficient.

The success of this program is evidenced by the 2015 Client Followup which surveyed 40% of the clients who received assistance and found that 60% were in stable housing and still employed!

Pax Christi has been providing financial support to Small Sums for the last five years.

WE BUILT THE DREAM!

THE ASTOUNDING people of Pax Christi were successful in accomplishing their commitment to help build and sponsor the Habitat dream house for a needy family in Prior Lake. This labor of love was done to honor our 35th Anniversary. The members of the Pax Christi Community are a formidable group when they work together to achieve their goals. Over a two-week period in the beginning of November, 94 people gave their gift of time and volunteered to help build a lovely home for a single mom and her 4 kids in the Prior Lake community. More than 35 people volunteered their time for several eight-hour days, even taking vacation time to help. These





volunteers included laborers, food delivery and set up volunteers, and very substantially the food hospitality staff who nourished us with extraordinary menus each day (thanks, Janell).

Studies have shown that strong families, strong neighborhoods, and lifelong learning begin at home, and Pax Christi's community members fulfilled their commitment to help build an affordable house for one low income family. The Project provided an opportunity for social action, community collaboration, developing community spirit, and an uplifting experience. As Paul Cress stated, "It was a good mix of experience, skills, and willingness to work." Workers helped each other in various functions and no one seemed intimidated. It was nice to see people smiling, laughing, and having fun doing a work of mercy. Susan Cavara stated, "It is impressive to see the dedication, hard work, and look of pure joy on people's faces." Many volunteers thought the experience was fun as Steve Allen and Marc Nosal stated, "We need more of these opportunities, and I want to do it again."

Once again, members of Pax Christi have dedicated their time and talent to the pursuit of Justice and Catholic Social Teaching. As Pope Francis said in his homily in March of 2014, "An authentic faith always implies a deep desire to change the world." YOU ARE AWESOME!!!

BRIDGING DRESSER BUILD

ONE OF THE PROJECTS undertaken by Pax Christi in honor of the parish's 35th Anniversary was a commitment to purchase and build 100 dressers for Bridging. The project honors the request of Fr. Tim Power to include a project with Bridging, which was born at Pax Christi.

On three Saturday mornings in October and November, groups of Pax Christi volunteers gathered over coffee and snacks at the Bridging warehouse in Bloomington. Most mornings they were greeted by Pax Christi's own Fran Heitzman, 90 years young and the founder of Bridging. The session began with Sara King, Bridging's Bloomington Volunteer Program Supervisor, providing an overview of the organization and how it improves lives by providing quality furniture and household goods to those transitioning out of homelessness and poverty. Sara also led the group on a tour of the large warehouse full of donated furniture and furnishings.

Then the group divided into teams of three or four and got to work. Each dresser comes as a flat-pack kit and requires considerable assembly. The first dresser is a learning experience and usually takes a while. Subsequent dressers generally go more quickly. Most teams were able to complete two or three dressers in a morning's work, and some were able to complete more than that. The Twite family (Paul, Mary, and Rebecca) were our dresser-building rock stars, finishing six dressers in a single morning!

Over the three Saturdays scheduled as of this writing, 83 volunteers have participated in the dresser project, ranging in age from teens to septuagenarians. On October 8 we welcomed a group of students from Cristo Rey High School to our crew. Volunteers report that they have enjoyed the experience, the fellowship, and the opportunity to help someone make the huge leap out of poverty or homelessness.

We have completed a total of 91 dressers thus far, and we're confident that we will soon finish off the remaining nine dressers in our commitment. The project has been a great opportunity to honor the spirit of Pax Christi in its 35th Anniversary year! Written by Jack Kegel, Pax Christi Justice Council.













OLD FRIENDS; NEW WAYS TO SERVE







PROP, an organization aptly named People Reaching Out to Other People, has been doing just that since 1971 when it was first established in Eden Prairie. PROP depends highly on volunteers from the community to help their neighbors in need by donating their time, food, and money.

Pax Christi has been partnering with PROP for many years to help feed and serve the destitute in Eden Prairie and Chanhassen. Burgundy Bags is a program in which Pax Christi members can fill burgundy totes with many needed food items to be delivered to PROP regularly. The Giving Garden is also a generous way that Pax Christi parish members can help feed those in need. Each

year the Giving Garden donates more than 1,200 pounds of organic tomatoes, green beans, cucumbers, potatoes, cabbage, peppers, peas, carrots, and more to help PROP provide fresh foods to Eden Prairie and Chanhassen-area families. Volunteers help in many ways to make the Giving Garden a community effort, from helping to plan and prepare for the garden in April, planting seeds and seedlings in mid to late May, and weeding, watering, picking, and delivering vegetables to PROP from June to September.

Interested volunteers can also work directly with PROP to donate their time, food, and money. Volunteer opportunities include working at the food

shelf, being a pantry greeter, and picking up rescue food from local grocers and retailers. Visit their website at propfood. org for information on how to get started.

few other exciting opportunities are coming up at PROP as well! Their 6th annual Empty Bowls event will be held on February 21 at 11:00am-1:30pm and 4:00-7:00pm at St. Andrew Lutheran Church in Eden Prairie. Empty Bowls has become an international grassroots project to raise funds for local food shelves. Participants can select their favorite handmade bowl, eat a simple meal of soup and bread, enjoy a variety of musical entertainment, and make a generous free will donation. Artists have also donated oneof-a-kind items for the silent auction.

Lastly, in January PROP is beginning an exciting new program to deliver food to seniors living at or below the poverty level in Chanhassen and Eden Prairie; it is called Senior Mobile Food Delivery. This amazing new program will help to feed elderly people in the community who might otherwise have a difficult time getting food to their homes.

CALLED AS ADVOCATES: ADVOCACY COMMITTEE OF THE JUSTICE COUNCIL

THE ADVOCACY COMMITTEE serves under the Justice Council at Pax Christi. A core value of Pax Christi is Justice: "We are advocates for the marginalized and champions for systemic change." As such, its purpose is to discern the most pressing needs of our community and beyond and to formulate and carry out plans and actions to meet these needs.

Systemic change is not merely a Band-Aid but a lasting improvement in the lives of our sisters and brothers on the margins of our society who need a voice: the hungry, the sick, the stranger, and the prisoner. We are inspired by the words of Jesus:

"Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me" (Matthew 25:34-36).

How do we do this? In 2016 we focused on advocating for more affordable housing and an increase in MFIP, the Minnesota Family Investment Program. This involved providing opportunities for parishioners to influence their state legislators by signing cards, writing letters, and making phone calls. Parishioners participated in the annual Walk for the Homeless in December, the JRLC (Joint Religious Legislative Coalition) Conference, Homeless Day on the Hill, and Voter Awareness prior to the November election.

The Committee is currently discerning the most pressing issues for 2017 and is looking for input from the parish. Our next meeting is Tuesday, January 24, 6:30pm at Pax Christi. WE ARE ALL MINISTERS, SHARING, SERVING, AND STRENGTHENING OUR FAITH

WE MADE a change in terminology over the past year; moving from calling those who share their time and talent for the ministries at Pax Christi from volunteers to shared ministers. Why the change? It's much more than semantics. We can all point to times when we have been "volunteered" for some task, sometimes, not the "opportunity" we would have selected and possibly a less than pleasant experience. Our names may have been added to the list of helpers when we missed a particular meeting where the tasks were assigned, our friend or spouse needed some more hands (and was quite persuasive), or a parent decided that it was our turn to lend a hand. Volunteers are an essential part of the world, the time shared by volunteers helps get work done and goals achieved — but the goals of the project may or may not be the same as held by its volunteers. Don't get me wrong, all volunteers gifts are appreciated, but the successful task or project is rated by meeting a particular goal, not whether or not the volunteer was transformed by the experience.

A shared minister's gift of time, talent, and/or resources is an intentional response made from a disciple of Jesus Christ. An example or two may help illustrate this point. A music minister may have the ability to sing or play an instrument, a wonderful talent indeed, but many of us can point to instances where the sung prayer in a Mass transformed our faith experience to a deeper, more intimate level, for both those listening as well as the instrumentalist or vocalist. Someone can lend a hand and show up for a Loaves and Fishes dinner and serve the hungry, but the shared ministers who have come month after month, and some for years, to Dorothy Day Center or to St. Stephen's to prepare and serve a meal are committed to doing their part to feed the hungry and live the Gospel, building a community of faith in a place where faith and hope are endangered. These shared ministers can tell stories of how their faith has been



fortified through their evangelization. Every single shared minister in the Pax Christi community will quickly agree that the gifts shared paled in comparison to how their own faith lives were renewed with each opportunity to give and serve. Just as being a disciple is so much more fulfilling than mere membership, sharing one's gifts as a minister is a deeper, faith-filled conversion from that of being a volunteer.

So it's time once again to celebrate our shared ministers with a winter warm up in the form of our Minnesota Mardi Gras — Shared Ministry Appreciation Event. Saturday, January 21, we will have an adult evening of fun and frolic beginning with Mass at 5:00pm. After Mass, we will continue the celebration of all of Pax Christi's Adult Shared Ministers. These are some of our reasons for being involved. Now, how are these problems related to Social Justice?

Pope Francis reminds us that we have an obligation to the poor and our future generations when he said, "20% of the world's population consumes resources at a rate that robs the poor and our future generations of what they need to survive." (No. 96 *Laudato Si*).

Choices we make in our busy lives can cause a huge effect on others. God created this world that we live in. We are borrowing it from Him so we can pass it on to our children. We are responsible to protect it for all human beings. It's important that we realize that we are all connected and what happens in one area affects someone else in another. Pope Francis says to "every person on the planet, we all share a common home." It is our responsibility to take care of it.

WHAT IS GOD CALLING ME TO DO?

HAVE YOU ever asked yourself "What is God calling me to do? Where can I make a difference?" What started out as a little outing with my daughter's dance team several years ago soon tugged at my heartstrings and suggested to me that I could do more; I could make a difference... at St. Anne's Place in Minneapolis. Why did this appeal to me? I think the main reason was that this special place is designed to help moms and their children in crisis. I could relate — I'm a mom. I know what an amazing job being a mom is, and I'm fortunate to have many resources and gifts to assist me in this great role. Others are not so fortunate. I admire the strength of these women to leave unstable, unhealthy situations, and want something better for themselves and their children. From the first time I went to visit St. Anne's Place, I was touched by the happy kids that I witnessed. Moms and their children were happy to have a roof over their head, food to eat, and a chance to get a new start. The needs at St. Anne's Place are many. Families are coming and going. I initially got more involved by organizing a "coats, hats, mittens, towels, and sheets drive" amongst my friends. It was a great thing to do with my children, a chance for them to grow in their charity work and witness how we can make a difference. From there, I invited my parents to get involved. St. Anne's Place pulled at their heartstrings as well. They wanted to get involved. The need for these basic necessities is on-going. Another great opportunity to help is at Christmas time. The staff at St. Anne's recognizes how important it is to make this a special time for its residents. There is a need for donations for moms and the children to shop for each other.

What do my parents and I hope to accomplish by deepening our commitment and involvement to St. Anne's Place? We hope for a chance to break the cycle... the poverty cycle, the idea that this is all the better I can do. Children learn by example. We need them to see better examples, to see that they can achieve more, and that they are loved, that we are all God's children. We feel it is our calling to be a part of the process when the women and children are ready to leave St. Anne's Place and get a place of their own. They need help setting up their new home life. We all know how much it takes to set up a house, to have the basics. Most of these women come to St. Anne's with barely anything of their own. St. Anne's offers them housing, food, basic necessities, and extensive case management and programming to overcome the trauma of homelessness. Because they are placed there by social services, there are many rules and restrictions — unfortunately a lot has to do with their length of stay. AN UPDATE ON BOW: BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

ON NOVEMBER 21 at Pax Christi we launched a brand new way to worship called *Breaking Open the Word*. The project was born from an idea of our Music Ministry Leader, Donna Kasbohm, and brought into being by the Worship Council. It's a Facebook group made up of members of Pax Christi. Every Sunday night the readings for the following weekend's masses are posted on the group page, and each member of the group receives a notification. Members can then comment on each reading. Members share with us how the scripture speaks to them and to their family, how the readings relate to what is happening in their daily lives and in their community.

So far we have 209 members. A handful of parishioners comment each week, and we are looking forward to more and more comments and conversations as the weeks go on. It is an exciting and different way to actively worship. When we hear the readings the next weekend at Mass, we know them, and we know how we relate to them. The homily becomes that much more interesting because it is yet another new insight and perspective. We want this to be a safe space for Pax Christi worshipers to connect with one another and use the bible to reflect on and better understand the issues we are dealing with today. It is a way for each of us to gain more insight into the people of Pax Christi, our struggles, and our triumphs.
